2 long straws for 2-straw plait 4 long straws for leaf

Spiral Halo Headband

Instructor's Comments: I was gifted a headband like this from Donna Hall. After some trial and error, I figured it out. Students will learn my headband technique, which makes for a comfortable fit. No more headband headaches. This Spiral Headband is well suited for additional trimming with straw flowers, leaves, or feathers.

Skill Level: Open


Size of Project: 6½" x 7¾" x 1½"

Prerequisites: Clove hitch knot

Prework: Bring cleaned straw (remove heads, leaves, and joint nodes.) Sort the straws into narrow and wider diameter groups. Prior to class, soak the straw until it is soft.

Techniques Taught in Class:

5-straw spiral plait (pg. 37-40 in Plait Directory)



*Plaiting straw: 70 straws, 10" long, 1st joint. Bring extra if they are shorter straws.

*Filler straw: 30-40 pieces, 4"-8" lengths, 2nd joints work well.

*Cover straw- 2-4 pieces total, 15", 3/32" diameter to cover the wire

Supplies Needed:

Galvanized garden wire uncoated – 15" 16-gauge, 55 lb./25kg. Available at hardware stores. Basic straw kit (thread, needle, snipper scissors, spray bottle, Aleene's Tacky Glue, bees wax) Wire cutter

Fine to medium grit sand paper (small piece)

Wrapped Rocks Rock!

Instructor's Comments: Natural materials have always inspired me to create. I do not recall when or where I first saw wrapped rocks, but I do know that once I saw them, I was immediately drawn to creating them. One of the projects, Ocean Waves, was inspired by a wrap that Ken Uy modified. He has permitted me to use his modified knot for this class.

Skill Level: Open

Size of Rocks: 4" x 3½" x ½"

Prerequisites: None

Prework: Bring a few rocks (three minimum). I recommend oblong or rectangular-shaped rocks. The most important thing to note is that the opposite sides of the rock should be as close to parallel as possible so that the cording does not slip off.

Techniques Taught in Class:

We will be wrapping rocks with leather cording in this class. Once you feel comfortable with the process, you may opt to wrap rocks on your own using natural cane.

Supplies Needed:

*Leather cording

Tape measure or ruler

Small (jewelry) needle-nose pliers or large sewing tweezers Small scissors or jewelry wire cutters

Small flat-headed screwdriver or awl to use as a wedge to lift cord wraps

Tacky or quick-dry glue (optional)

McFarlane passed away many years ago, but I know she would be excited to see this design used again.

Prerequisites: Participants must know how to plait in-hand and have good plaiting skills.

Brewin Hat Plait

Straws Needed: Good plaiting straw, such as Kansas wheat and North Dakota Black Beard Durum

35 matched straws with heads for the dolly 11 or 22 straws to learn the Brewin plait.



Some years ago, I learned to make an old hat plait at one of our NAWW Conventions and I think it was from Janet Brewin (England) or Nonie McFarlane (Australia), or from them both! I really enjoy it and created one of my Sanctuary Easter Crosses using pairs for the cross arms and leg. I named the cross the *Hope Eternal Cross* ©2002.

I recently revisited this cross and its old plaits and decided to submit this 'corn dolly" for a class at the NAWW Sisters, OR Convention in 2025. I went on a hunt to figure out the plait and finally came to the Brewin Hat Plait. Gladys Brockway (KS) wrote the instructions for the NAWW Plait Directory. Enjoy learning to plait eleven straws into this old fashion hat plait!



S-Swirl and Straw Covered Hair Stick

Session E, Saturday, 8:30-12:00

Instructor/Designer: Leanne Fredrick

Designation for Project Use: Full use of the project is granted to NAWW members.

Instructor's Comments: Linda Beiler wore a similar hair ornament at a NAWW Convention. I do not know the origin, but with some trials, I made one that works brilliantly. I also experimented and made a hair stick to secure the S-Swirl. It has a straw covered wire and a straw ribbon wrapped bead.

Skill Level: Open

Size of Project: $3'' \times 6^{1/2}'' \times 2^{1/4}''$

Prerequisites: Clove hitch knot

Prework: Clean the straw (remove heads, leaves and joint nodes). Leave one joint node attached to the straw to be used for the hair stick. Be sure straw is soaked and pliable before class.

Techniques Taught in Class:

5-straw spiral plait

Straw ribbon wrapped bead

Straws Needed: Softer variety (Larned, Scout, or Pronghorn)

*Plaiting straws: 60-70 straws, 16" long, using 1st joint.

*Wire covered straw: 1 straw 5"-7" long (3/32" -1/8" diameter), 2nd joint with the joint node intact

*Straw for straw ribbons to wrap a bead: 1-3 straws for splits (1/16" or 2mm or narrower)

Supplies Needed:

Basic straw kit (thread, needle, snipper scissors, spray bottle, scraper, Aleene's tacky glue, bees wax)

*Small piece of sand paper (fine-medium grit)

*Galvanized wire, uncoated, 30" 16 gauge

Gloves (if your hands get sore)

Wire cutter

Flat iron (hair) for making straw ribbons (purchased from a thrift shop)

*Wooden bead, ½" (12 mm) diameter with a 1/4" diameter hole
